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Super: Every line of dialogue is excerpted from real interviews conducted with prospective candidates.

INT. INTERVIEW ROOM - DAY

Toplit with fluorescents. Bare wall behind. Hint of a white desk lower frame.

The full faces of the SPEAKERS are never seen on camera, but inserts of mouths, hands, ECU of eyes are. The camera is focussed in the main on the INTERVIEWEE. Camera is a zoom lens, and the shooting style is the 70s-inflected voyeurism of William Friedkin/John Cassavetes.

Camera on empty chair.

FIRST SPEAKER

Do we -

SECOND SPEAKER

Uh

FIRST SPEAKER

I think...

SECOND SPEAKER

Yeah

FIRST SPEAKER Got a couple minutes though.

SECOND SPEAKER

Mmm. (beat) I'll do it.

We hear but do not see a door open to the right. INTERVIEWEE enters (Black man, late 20s, cheap suit, big smile).

INTERVIEWEE (smile in his voice) Hi there. Thanks for seeing me.

He pauses right of frame, leans over out of our viewing to shake hands.

SECOND SPEAKER Oh, thanks.

FIRST SPEAKER (leaning across frame to shake hand) Yeah, thanks for coming in.

INTERVIEWEE sits down. Camera is tight on his face. Close enough to record micromovements of the face. This, and the texture of the voice, is where the drama lies.

> SECOND SPEAKER So uh. Oh shall we get some water would you like some water?

INTERVIEWEE Yes, yes. Sure thanks.

Hold for beat as door opens. Then closes. Then a hand places a carafe of water and empty glass on the table. The INTERVIEWEE smooths his tie.

> INTERVIEWEE (CONT'D) (nodding to person who just put the jug down) Thank you.

FIRST SPEAKER Right then. Thank you [bleep] for coming in today. Bit of a wet one.

SECOND SPEAKER

Mm.

FIRST SPEAKER So. My name is [bleep] and I joined the company... gosh, when was it?

SECOND SPEAKER You? Dunno, what four five years ago now.

FIRST SPEAKER

Yeah, fourfive, give or take. So I have moved around a few of the divisions, but I started where you're looking to start now. If you get the job haha.

SECOND SPEAKER

Haha.

INTERVIEWEE effects a laugh.

SECOND SPEAKER (CONT'D) I'm seven years into my sentence. [beep] here is a little more junior than I am, but as I'm sure you've been told by your recruiter, we like to do things a little differently here.

INTERVIEWEE (nodding, which will come to be a sign of nerves) Different. Okay. Different is good.

FIRST SPEAKER We have your CV in front of us here, but I'm keen to hear a bit more from you.

INTERVIEWEE

Okay.

SECOND SPEAKER Ah, before we begin, you did sign the waiver before coming in.

INTERVIEWEE

Uh, yes.

SECOND SPEAKER Ah good, so you're completely okay with being filmed.

INTERVIEWEE

Filmed?

FIRST SPEAKER For management and training purposes for our side.

INTERVIEWEE Oh. I don't know if that was in the...

SECOND SPEAKER It's fine. You're fine.

INTERVIEWEE Is that what the other guy is for?

FIRST SPEAKER

Who, Doug?

DOUG I'm not here. Just sitting in. SECOND SPEAKER Doug's just sitting in.

INTERVIEWEE For management and training purposes.

FIRST SPEAKER Sense of humour? We like that. (beat) So like I said, we have your CV in front of us here, but we're really excited to hear more about you. So, why don't you start by telling us a bit about yourself?

INTERVIEWEE straightens in their seat. Game time.

INTERVIEWEE Of course. So I -

JUMP CUT.

SAME - LATER.

FIRST SPEAKER And how's your search going.

INTERVIEWEE My jobsearch?

y jobbearen.

SECOND SPEAKER

Yeah.

The INTERVIEWEE answers by affecting an ease which all present know isn't genuine. Zoom into face. Inserts of eyes and mouth delivering these lines, so we know they're meant to be sincere, but don't come all the way together as convincing.

> INTERVIEWEE It's going well. (beat) Yeah I think it's going well, you know. With each round, each firm I talk to, I really get the sense confirmed, I mean - that this is the right next step for me to take.

SECOND SPEAKER (unconvinced) Uh huh. Yeah.

FIRST SPEAKER Good answer. Sound of papers shuffling and notes being scribbled. INTERVIEWEE SECOND SPEAKER And so this stage, the sev- Seventh yeah. INTERVIEWEE (CONT'D) Yeah. It's just this and then a decision, right. I mean, that's what the recruiter said. SECOND SPEAKER Well. Then that's what the recruiter said. (beat) But, we may ... You know - the process is very delicate and we all want to get this right. INTERVIEWEE ...Right. SECOND SPEAKER Because it's not good to waste your time. Or ours. INTERVIEWEE Of course, yeah yeah. SECOND SPEAKER (trailing off, as if talking to himself.) Market so volatile. INTERVIEWEE Mm. FIRST SPEAKER Uhhh okay. Sorry just tallying up some notes here. We have the video but I like to -INTERVIEWEE Sure, of course. I'm the same, I often find it easier, you know, to recall.

FIRST SPEAKER Right. Right.

INTERVIEWEE

Details.

FIRST SPEAKER Yes. Details. We're very detail oriented here.

SECOND SPEAKER Very. It's a big thing.

CAMERA slowly begins to dolly left, until the INTERVIEWEE is sandwiched between the shoulders of each SPEAKER.

INTERVIEWEE

Mm.

FIRST SPEAKER And so, one of the details we take very seriously is our diversity and antiracist policy.

SECOND SPEAKER Very seriously.

INTERVIEWEE

Of course. That's good to hear. I mean, so many places say "we really value diversity, it's important to us", but then it's just more about PR than anything else.

SECOND SPEAKER

Right. And for us you know, diversity, diversity of thought is really important to our business functions. And to our reputations with clients.

FIRST SPEAKER

Exactly. We value antiracism. So could you give us an example maybe from your professional experience, or maybe personal experience, where this has been in evidence for you.

INTERVIEWEE

From my...

FIRST SPEAKER

Yeah, you've got quite an eclectic working life so far. Really very interesting. Perhaps there's an example there from school maybe, or university. You went to a very competitive one; that must have been something. SECOND SPEAKER Or your background. What heritage were you again?

INTERVIEWEE (immediate and overly sweet) I'm from the West Country.

SECOND SPEAKER Ohhhh. Oh that's a bit -

FIRST SPEAKER Yeah, surprising.

SECOND SPEAKER Bit different.

FIRST SPEAKER

It's important. To us. To the company. You know, I love being the diversity lead here at the firm because it's so great to see people from all over.

SECOND SPEAKER All over, yeah.

FIRST SPEAKER

I mean, when you think of how far things have really come. I grew up in Essex, you know, typical Essex lad. And growing up I'd have never talked to someone like you, but, you know. Progress and diversity.

SECOND SPEAKER FIRST SPEAKER (CONT'D) Yes. We're very awake here. Woke.

SECOND SPEAKER (CONT'D) Yeah that's it.

INTERVIEWEE Oh... cool. I'm not really familiar with what that word means. (beat) But that sounds... great.

SECOND SPEAKER

Great.

FIRST SPEAKER

Great.

SECOND SPEAKER

Do you, uh, you have any questions for us?

INTERVIEWEE Oh yes, I do have a couple.

FIRST SPEAKER I think we might have gone over a little.

INTERVIEWEE

Over?

FIRST SPEAKER

My fault. My fault. If you think of anything else, on top of our couple of questions, pop them across in an email and we'll get back to you that way with next steps.

The stand. Their backs bookend each side of the frame. This forces the INTERVIEWEE to stand and smile awkwardly. They shake hands.

INTERVIEWEE

Um. Thank you.

FIRST SPEAKER Doug can show you out. Doug can you show him out?

DOUG Yeah I'll show him out.

DOUG crosses frame, back to us, and follows the INTERVIEWEE out.

On DOUG closing the door, we cut to:

But a bit ...

Medium shot of SPEAKERS - we observe them fully for the first time.

FIRST SPEAKER and SECOND SPEAKER sit. Camera remains in place. They pass notes to each other. Sip water.

FIRST SPEAKER Pretty good. SECOND SPEAKER Pretty good, yeah. (he nods his head) FIRST SPEAKER Yeah. Yeah he was. (beat) Experience is fine. Strong. Even against other applicants. Great grades.

SECOND SPEAKER Yeah. He's smart. I think it's just a fit issue. You could tell from the beginning. Bit arrogant.

FIRST SPEAKER That's the word, yeah. Full of himself I think. Not a good fit for morale.

Door opens. DOUG enters. Head taking up the left third of the frame.

DOUG What's the verdict?

FIRST SPEAKER What do you think?

DOUG Mm. Nice lad; He seemed quite good. I liked him.

SECOND SPEAKER Really? See, he is good. I did say that.

FIRST SPEAKER Aggressive, I find. (beat) Anyway, we on for lunch?

SECOND SPEAKER I'm famished, me.

FIRST SPEAKER I could go for some. You're buying, though.

They get up and head to the door. Camera pans slowly left as they shuffle past it. They turn off the light. Camera frames them as they walk down the corridor, snatches of conversation floating to us sporadically. INTERVIEWEE alone. He walks up the corridor, forlorn, as camera tracks back on the diagonal. The sounds of the city beyond the building are muffled but present.

EXT. STREET - DAY

INTERVIEWEE walks alone, purposeful. Camera watches him in wide from the other side of the street. He has his phone at his ear.

INTERVIEWEE Another washout. (beat) Yeah I dunno about this one. Seven rounds you know - seven - and they don't have time to answer any questions I have?

He spots a news agents, moves to duck inside.

INTERVIEWEE (CONT'D) Nah it wasn't the worst, just tiring. Inane. (beat) C'est la vie.

INT. NEWSAGENT - CONTINUOUS

Eyes scanning the fridge. He grabs a sandwich.

INTERVIEWEE I'm just in the shop now; I'll be home by eightish.

His eye alights on the LOTTO table.

INTERVIEWEE (CONT'D) Yeah cool. Text me when you get in. Love you man.

He ends the call.

He fills the lottery ticket out. Planar ECU of the numbers being filled out (think of D. W. Griffith's iris shots).

In line ahead of him, is DOUG, carrying an armful of food and drink.

One of the plastic bottles escapes his grasp, and INTERVIEWEE bends to pick it up immediately.

DOUG looks as if he'll speak, but the smiles tell all that needs be said.

DOUG (eyes on the lotto ticket) Good luck.

He nods and leaves.

INTERVIEWEE reaches the counter. Politely addresses unseen shopkeeper.

INTERVIEWEE Just these, please.

INT. APARTMENT - EVENING

Medium/wide of apartment living room. We hear a shower in operation.

INTERVIEWEE opens door, slaps off shoes, loosens tie.

Deposits half eaten sandwich and lotto ticket on the coffee table.

CU: TV is on, but muted, showing the lottery draw.

INTERVIEWEE removes his jacket, dropping it on the couch. Walks frame right (to the shower sound) and to presumably continue undressing himself out of our sight.

Intercut between the TV and the lotto ticket. The hosts' gleeful faces, contrasted with the mundanity of the ticket.

CU: Ticket fluttering a little, while out of focus, the TV screen shows the word: "JACKPOT!!!" flashing over and over again.

The sole sound that persists is the shower.

FADE TO BLACK.
